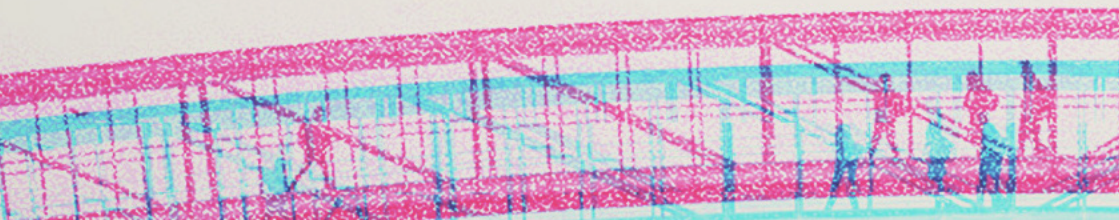

ENCOUNTERING INFRASTRUCTURES

Studying science, technology, and society through the lens of infrastructures is no doubt a well-established STS tradition. It has guided our attention to how we live with the things of the world. However, in times of crisis, change, hype, and hope new demands to encounter infrastructures arise. Infrastructures do not only bring smoothness, efficiency, and connectivity, they are also sites of environmental disaster, leakage, cyber-attacks, and violations of privacy and power. From debates around European digital sovereignty and the spread of AI to the fragile maintenance of institutions of knowledge and welfare states, there is a renewed urgency to infrastructures today. With this conference, we invite participants to encounter infrastructures in new ways:

What are the most intriguing contemporary cases of infrastructuring? How are infrastructures imagined, built, and sustained in different domains? What (in)visibilities, dependencies, controversies, and versions of 'the good' emerge from and with infrastructuring?

How are infrastructures lived as ecological, affective, and more-than-human assemblages? How can artistic, speculative, and experimental methodologies energize and enrich STS studies of infrastructure?

What insights can be drawn from moments in the life of infrastructures, such as renewal, updates, breakdowns, decommissioning, and ending? What can we learn from the many human or nonhuman actors who shape, experience, contest, or depend upon infrastructures in everyday life? How can STS scholars contribute to building better infrastructures?

Working Relations: How to Build Resonance with Things and Infrastructures

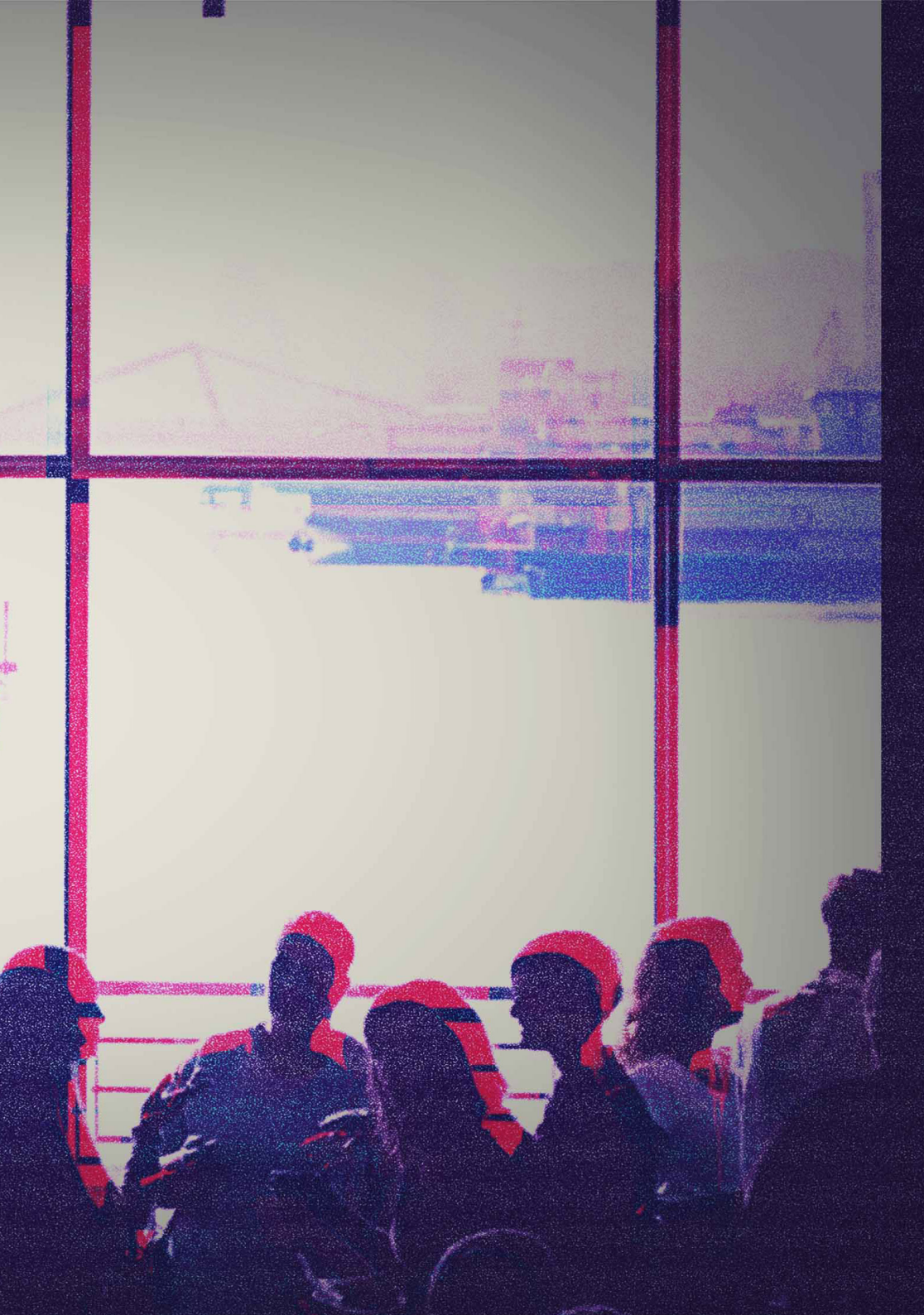

Steven Jackson is a Professor of Information Science and Science and Technology Studies and Vice-Provost for Academic Innovation at Cornell University.

Can we hold a working relation to infrastructure? What would this mean? What might it require and produce? Building on work in repair, care and infrastructure studies and near-to-hand examples of an umbrella, a tractor and a pond, this talk explores working relations as a mode of engagement and resonance with the worlds around us. It also considers how infrastructures in their current form may challenge and break working relations; and what it might take to bring infrastructures back into alignment with this important mode of human action and relation.

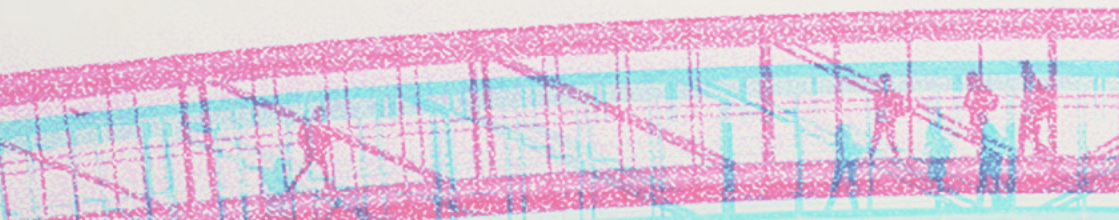

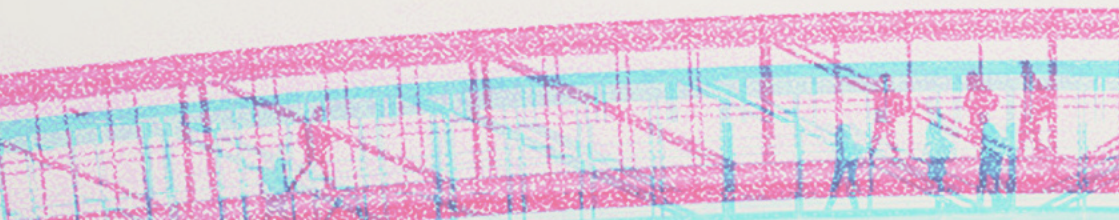
