INTERNATIONAL LAW AND THE PROTECTION OF PEOPLE IN TODAY'S WORLD

CONTENT, PROGRESS AND PEDAGOGY OF THE MODULE

• This course centers around the international law issues that bear upon today's world. The list of issues can include legal responses to current threats to maritime security, such as piracy or hybrid attacks on ships, internet cables and pipelines. The nature of armed conflict is changing and, with a starting point in current wars across the globe, the course will explore the laws surrounding modern conflicts that are challenging legal classifications of, for example, aggression, occupation, self-determination, genocide, torture and other new forms of international crime, such as 'ecocide'. In addition, the course will examine the issues of Al-warfare and international law. The course will also delve into the application of international law to other major threats to human and national security, including the problem of externalization of protection of national borders, which impacts on vulnerable people, such as smuggled refugees and migrants at sea, people in crowded and unsafe detention, or women and children stranded in Syrian camps; and the problem of climate change, looking at a human rights and other legal approaches in international climate change litigation.

To explore these issues, the course begins by establishing an understanding of the building blocks of international law, including the setting, legal actors, principles and the sources of international law, the international law regimes and the institutions, such as international courts and tribunals, and the relationship of international law to national law. This foundation is then explored and expanded on, directly in relation to current situations that draw on and challenge international law in today's world. The students' course preparation is supported by tools such as 'talking power-points' and quizzes, and students' legal problem solving is facilitated by combining lectures with follow-up guest-lectures and workshops, where students apply their knowledge to legal problems in international relations.

• Lectures, with interactive and problem-oriented discussion, combined with problem-based workshops and facilitation of short project writing.
